Post Secondary Education or Training

A n access window to postsecondary education and training, especially via the university route, is closing, if it hasn't been slammed shut already. We are living in an inflationary economy where costs appear to be out of control. Spikes in food bills, housing, transportation, utilities, and car and home insurance are all skyrocketing. What will the immediate and distant future look like for us and our offspring?

To try to make sensible predictions about what's in store and specifically about the costs of education propel us into hazardous terrain. Still, our plans for the future require us to hedge our bets about what the future will look like and how to embrace it. As many a teacher knows, the old adage that those who fail to plan, plan to fail holds wide truth.

One of my favorite classroom activities when I met students in grade 12 English for the first time was to encourage them to discuss their goals after graduation. Invariably, the discussion turned to education choices and finances. Students fell into one of three categories: some couldn't answer exactly, several envisioned going on to university or Nova Scotia Community College, and others anticipated entering the workforce.

Most students knew that without any additional education and/or training, they'd more than likely continue on in one or more of the food or retail service sector jobs they had already undertaken ever since they'd turned sixteen.

Fifty-years is not so far distant that seniors can't recollect it. Two generations ago, across Canada, it was possible for high school graduates living near a university to continue to live at home, pay for university, and emerge after three or four years with a degree as a pathway to a career without the burden of tens of thousands of dollars in debt.

Some people back then trained for vocations as teachers or nurses by entering Teachers' College or nursing school without the requirement of investing in unaffordable university degrees. These pathways have all but dried up as universities have come to monopolize career credentials for aspiring architects, business analysts, physiotherapists, and zoologists.

Today those fortunate enough to have generous parental or other financial support can still pursue post-school education/training plans. But without any real funding, steadily rising tuition, housing, and living expenses are exerting scary financial pressures

on our young people. For far too many, the disappointment of unfulfilled dreams of employment at the end is a painful initiation into adulthood.

Fortunately, Nova Scotia Community Colleges do offer an alternative track forward, other than too expensive university education, providing meaningful relief from a good portion of education debt. As a parent and as a teacher, I have been truly impressed by the growth of the Community College in terms of physical infrastructure and programming throughout Nova Scotia. I do not know who to credit for this positive development but it does benefit high school grads in at least two ways: to enter an accredited career in service and trade or to reduce the time spent in high-priced introductory university courses.



NEW BOOK LAUNCH: Failing Forward in Saarland

ailing Forward in Saarland is the memoir of a transplanted Canadian with Caribbean roots, venturing with her husband and their daughter into Saarland, Germany. The memoir describes the year the family spent in this small forested land tucked away in the western corner of Germany on the border to France. Her teenage daughter made the daily commute to attend a lycée in France and her husband spent most days doing research in labs and forests. What was

the mother and wife left to do in the Saarland with next to no knowledge of the German language let alone the Frankish accent? As a career teacher, the author's life had never before been reduced to awaiting the daily home-coming of a daughter and husband. During her year in Saarland, she did much more than that. This book is an entertaining and informative account by an experienced Black teacher of what it means to transplant a family into a foreign country and how to

enjoy a welcoming culture.


Most significantly, this memoir is a meaningful addition to the literary corpus focusing on strangers in a strange land. Even though the author is intimately familiar with the notion — she has lived most of her adult life in Canada, far from her Barbados birthplace — she immediately faces the challenges of adjusting to the customs of a new land and, especially, learning to communicate in German. And


her story is anything but ordinary — it's a moving, often amusing, and sometimes humbling account of the author's adventures and learning experiences in a largely unknown country without the benefit of fluency in the local language. As the title indicates, the author comes to view these challenges — and even failures — as positive "life lessons in adaptability, strength, and resilience" — failing forward.

Why Phonics Builds Better Readers

magine this: your three-year-old has memorized every word of their favourite bedtime story. They are captivated by refrigerator magnets, asking you to name each letter as they line them up. These are the first signs—it's time to teach your child to read!

Starting the reading journey is an exciting milestone. The first step? Take a trip to the library and let your child choose a few books. This builds a sense of ownership and excitement, sparking an early love for reading. But beyond selecting books, the method you use to teach reading plays an even more critical role.

The Debate: Phonics vs. Whole Language

Reading instruction falls into two categories: phonics and whole language. Phonics teaches children to break words down into sounds, or "phonemes," which are then blended to form words. This method mirrors how children naturally learn language: by listening, distinguishing sounds, and eventually combining them to create meaning.

Whole language, on the other hand, treats words as entire units to be memorized rather than broken down. However, this method can be confusing for young children. The whole language approach can limit a child's reading progress because it relies on memorizing entire words rather than breaking them down into sounds. While this method can help children recognize a few familiar

Space Planning – Where it all begins

¶veryone desires a beautiful **♦** home, but true design begins **△** with functionality. Before aesthetics, the key is effective space planning. Understanding a few fundamental principles and measurements can significantly improve the design of any space, be it an entire house or a single room.

A basic rule of thumb is that an individual occupies approximately 24 inches. This measurement is crucial when considering seating arrangements or navigating tight spaces. For paths of travel, such as hallways or walkways through a room, a minimum of 36 inches is necessary. Open floor plans, while visually appealing, often face challenges in this regard. What appears as a large, open area can quickly become cramped due to multiple travel paths required for access to various exit points, leaving less usable space for furniture.

Bathrooms and kitchens present unique challenges. Bathrooms typically involve fitting multiple fixtures into a limited area, while kitchens require careful coordination of numerous elements to ensure smooth and efficient operation.


Bedrooms and living spaces also have their complexities. A common oversight is selecting furniture that doesn't properly fit the room. For instance, while a kingsize bed might be desired, if there isn't at



least 24 inches of clearance on either side, a smaller bed would be a more practical choice. Similarly, large dining tables or sectionals might be appealing, but if they overwhelm the space, alternative options should be considered.

When embarking on a design project, prioritizing space planning is essential. Laying a solid foundation with a well-thought-out layout before focusing on fixtures and finishes will ultimately lead to a more successful and satisfying result.


