Let them know (generally) what you will be doing while they are at camp. can be a part of the celebration. Children are very sensitive to your emotions. Show them you believe they will be safe. Help them to understand the skills they will learn and the value of them having these skills.




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

What Does Your Child Really Need This Summer?

cummer is right around that corner - again. Nearly every parent is planning madly for enrolment in summer camps, family vacations away or nearby at the cottage... and for all that time in between.

For some parents, all that time in between activities and getaways is difficult to navigate. The media and also other parents tell us that our children need to be active, happy and nurtured emotionally, physically and

But what do our children really need in order to have a 'great summer'? The answer is relatively easy and sounds simple, but is harder to act on - especially given present societal pressures and expectations.

Children and teens need a healthy balance of time with people, time away from primary caregivers and time to themselves. How do we provide this to them? Scheduling a camp for a week when a parent needs to work is a great example. How does a parent then temper that time away with time alone (without technology!) and time with a parent, being nurtured and heard?

Here are some beginning ideas, for the summer and beyond:

Take an inventory of your child's interests. We often feel that we know our children and what they might like to do, but perhaps the interests of your child have changed. Or, with some uninterrupted conversation, you begin to realize that the interest in whales and oceans has changed to tidal pools or crustaceans!

Make it a point at the beginning of the summer to make a list of 'Things I'd Like to Know More About' with your child. Teach yourself about the topic, and start an engaging conversation about it with your child. Orient portions of library trips, activities and day trips around each child's interest in turn. Teach your child how to explore a concept or idea with a mix of self-directed teaching and just pure happening on interesting details about their interest

Hang out together. As parents who are working/studying hard to maintain or increase a standard of living, we often put pressure on ourselves to always be 'doing For smaller children, it is easier to something' with our children. Shouldn't that time together be interesting and memorable, because it may be necessarily brief or not frequent? Of course! -you feel you have neglected time with your child while you worked extra hours or studied instead of going to the park. How can you now make that time together, whether it be an hour or a whole afternoon, memorable?

What your child really needs may surprise you.... Children and teens need relaxed, unstructured time with their parents just as much, if not more, than goal-directed or activitybased time. Some of my most memorable moments from my own childhood are when we were Maritime storm-stayed and no one could go anywhere! My parents then sat down with me and chatted, with the conversation leading itself. They taught me how to patiently listen, to respond with my ideas and value quiet time with others.

Or walking in the garden with my mother, to 'see what's up'... all times when the world seems to veritably stop for a moment or an hour, and suddenly there are opportunities for more connection and quieter communication. Sit down with your child, hide the clock and make it a goal to let them lead the conversation. Or go for a walk or bike ride with them... sometimes the loudest conversations are when we are not talking at all.

Limit 'screen time'. The media has saturated us with warnings about screen time and its adverse effect on children and teens. What we are just now beginning to realize is that adults are detrimentally affected, too - and in turn, families.

We need to protect ourselves, as well as our children, from the overuse of cell phones, laptops, video games and television. If your goal is to connect with your child, put away the devices. When interaction with your child is over a screen, like a video game, you are both missing out on the give-and-take that mobilizes the nervous system into making integrated pathways leading to growth. Be present to one another, listen actively and put away anything that is competing for the time you deserve to give to each other.

Make sure peer time is good time.

plan a get-together and structure the time (or not) to make sure it goes well. With teens, it is more difficult.

Be part of your teen's summer social life, at least in an informed sense. Know who the new friendships are with, and how important these budding relationships are to your teen. Use times such as driving them places, having coffee out or 'sitting on the edge of the bed' conversation moments as a way to ask simple questions. You may be surprised how much information you are given, when you slow down and are present to your teen. They still value your attention, especially when it is undivided - they may choose to not show it, but they do.

Teach them how to 'be' in quiet or in stillness. Share with your child or teen how the stress of the day affects you - but focus then on the strategies you use to help yourself put away the day. Educate them about your 'quieter self' - the one who paints after everyone is in bed, reads an incredible novel or engages in a meditative sitting practice.

Let them see and learn from you learn about the value of quiet time by yourself, where you focus on your inner stress and make a plan for reentering a difficult situation. This is an important skill to teach your child and teen, and also it also shows your vulnerability/strength more as a person, not a parent.

You know your child best... I think we all need to make sure we are mindful of each of our children's present needs in turn, and think of ways to nurture them using our presence.

So... nurturing and meeting needs doesn't necessarily mean a trip to the local bookstore or a pricey summer camp experience. It may be as simple as providing your child time with you to ask questions, to teach them how to listen to their own thoughts and be present, and to value the relational experience of others. That is a true gift that can last a

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Our Top 5 Tax Topics for families

rith tax season upon us, it is helpful to understand various tax benefits and credits relating to separated families. Here are our top 5 topics discussed with clients:

1. Childcare

Which parent claims the childcare deduction generally depends on the parenting arrangement. If there is a primary care parent, typically that parent will claim the deduction. They will often pay these costs directly, and receive a contribution to the expenses as part of child

support.

It is possible for parents in shared parenting to make different arrangements for childcare expenses. For instance, each parent might pay some or all expenses directly to the provider, and each claim what they paid for income tax purposes. It is important to receive legal advice about child support arrangements and shared parenting situations.

2. Dependent Children

After a separation, one or both parents may be able to claim the federal 'eligible dependent

credit' to reduce their taxes payable. If there is a primary care parent, they may claim the credit if they meet specific criteria. In shared parenting, it can be possible for both parents to be eligible to claim the credit by claiming the child every other year or each claiming one child. Child support Orders or Agreements should be carefully drafted for this to be possible.

3. Canada Child Benefit (CCB)


The CCB is a tax-free monthly payment. Eligibility is determined by the Canada Revenue Agency. If there is a primary care parent, that parent should apply for the benefit. In shared parenting, typically each parent can apply for 50% of the benefit entitlement calculated by CRA for their household.

4. Legal expenses

5. Child support /Spousal support

Spousal support which is paid on a periodic basis and according to an Agreement or Court Order is tax deductible to the payor and is taxable

Prevention Of Sports-Related Dental Injuries

Sports activities have an inherent risk of orofacial injuries due to falls, collisions, contact with hard surfaces and equipment. Children between the ages 7-11 years old are most susceptible to sports-related oral injuries. Consequences of orofacial

injuries for children and their families are substantial because of potential for pain, psychological trauma and cost. The latter includes indirect cost such as hours lost from school (for children) and work (for parents).

The majority of sports-related dental and orofacial injuries affect the upper lip, upper jaw and upper teeth. Although some of these injuries are unavoidable, most can be prevented. Helmets, facemasks and mouthguards have been shown to reduce the frequency and severity of dental/ orofacial trauma. Using these protective pieces should be mandatory during field or ice hockey,

football, baseball and other such sports activities.

A mouthguard is an appliance placed in the mouth to reduce injuries to the teeth, jaws and the lips. It will protect the teeth and jaws from fracture and displacement and the lips from bruising and laceration. Customfabricated mouthguards made in the dental office using a model of the patient's teeth provide maximum protection against injury. Over-the-counter mouthguards, on the other hand, provide less protection against injury to the teeth and may interfere with speech and breathing. These temporary devices could serve as short-term options during orthodontic treatment and

during the period of transition from baby teeth to adult teeth.

Routine dental visits can be an opportunity to initiate parent/ child education and recommendations for the use of a properly fitted mouthguard.

The New Age of Orthodontics: Any Age

Think you are too old or too young to think about Orthodontics? Well think again.

Orthodontics is specialized area of dentistry that focuses on growth and development of the jaws and alignment and movement mechanics of the teeth. Healthy teeth and jaws are an important part of overall health. We rely on the mechanics of this complex system to function properly in order for us to eat, chew, swallow and speak properly. In other words, Orthodontics involves a lot more than just straightening teeth.

It is a common misconception that Orthodontics is "braces for teenagers." While the teenage years coincide with the eruption of permanent teeth and a growth spurt that makes treatment at this age ideal, teen treatment is only one part of an Orthodontic practice. Young children can also benefit from a trip to the Orthodontist as early diagnosis and preventative measures may mean they never require braces. The Canadian and American Orthodontic Associations recommend that all children have an orthodontic check-up by age 7. An early exam is an important step in your child's healthcare as early detection of some problems can indicate early treatment to avoid braces or surgery later on. Your orthodontist can also give you a bit of a prediction, much like a weather forecast, of what may lie ahead so that you can plan for any future treatment needs. Often Orthodontists like to see patients at a regular recall interval to track growth over time.

Adults, of all ages, can also benefit from treatment to ideally align teeth and jaws and more then ever adults are choosing to embark upon their own orthodontic adventure. The effects of aging, combined with a poorly functioning bite, often causes wear of the teeth and surrounding structures. Adult patients may be seeking a treatment plan to fully restore their teeth to proper function or they may simply wish to improve esthetics to achieve the smile they have always dreamed of. Often times they are pleasantly

surprised to find that esthetics and function go hand in hand so they will find their final result is both a functioning bite and beautiful smile.

Although some dentists perform limited orthodontic work, an Orthodontist is a certified specialist who is a dentist first, who then completes a 3 year residency in Orthodontics following their dental training. The easiest way to verify if a dentist is an orthodontist is to ask if they are a member of the Canadian Association of Orthodontists,

Whatever your age or motivation, there are new advancements in Orthodontics that allow you to reach your goals more efficiently and esthetically. Ask your local Orthodontist what Orthodontics can do for you and your family.

And the Oscar Goes To...

s early childhood educators, we have front row seats to not only the funny moments, but to the emotional moments experienced by young children. Certainly, drop off time qualifies as one of the more emotional moments, often evoking Oscar worthy performances with children clinging to their parents while uttering pleas of "don't go Mommy, Please!"

Separation anxiety is the fear young children experience at the thought of being separated from their parents, and can often be just as traumatic for parents as it is for the children. Separation anxiety is common among preschoolers, particularly when they are entering childcare for the first time. Although a normal part of early childhood

development, it can be one of the more challenging stages, and as with the many other challenges of raising children, keeping your sense of humor makes things a little easier.

It's been my experience that for many children the previously mentioned Oscar worthy performance at drop off time is just that, a performance meant to pull on parent's heartstrings, and within minutes of your departure they are happily playing without any lingering upsets brought on by their own emotional performance. The same is not always true for parents who are left feeling guilty, and overwhelmed as to how to help their child cope, but hopefully the suggestions below will help make saying goodbye a little easier for everyone.

- Practice leaving your child for brief periods of time prior to returning to the work force, this can be particularly important for parents who have practiced attachment parenting, and co-sleeping.
- Establish a predictable routine by dropping off, and picking your child up at the same time each day so they will know what to expect.
- Avoid lingering too long as it often results in greater emotional upset, but be sure to say goodbye rather than slipping away when they're not looking while letting them know they will be alright, and you will be back soon.
- Remember that your child will take their emotional cues

from you, so by smiling, and keeping a positive attitude at drop off time they will be more likely to do the same.


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 Lastly remember that this stage too shall pass so enjoy while you can all their joyous, and not so joyous Oscar worthy moments.

Rethinking Summer Learning

o you remember that old saying: no more pencils, no more books, no more teachers...well, you know the rest. It's time to rethink that saying, especially the "no more books" part. Times have changed, and the thought of summer school-and summer learning-is no longer reserved for struggling students. In fact, reports show that across North America, enrolment in summer school programs is on the rise, and not just because students are performing poorly throughout the school year. Students looking to get ahead, to tackle extra credits, and get a competitive advantage are signing themselves up for summer school.

With education becoming increasingly competitive and global, students of all ages recognize that summer is the perfect time to pull ahead. Without having to balance the workload of the regular school year, they can make impressive academic gains.

Research in summer learning studies shows that 56% of students want to be involved in a summer program that "helps kids keep up with summer schoolwork or prepare for the next grade," which is good news, as it means that they understand the importance of summer learning.

Here are some of the other facts about summer learning:

FACT: Summer learning loss affects ALL students

School may shut down for two months, but brains need continuous stimulation in order to remain sharp. Without keeping the brain active over the summer holiday, students can need up to six weeks to return to the learning level they were at the year before. It is a misconception that summer school is only for students who have failed the previous year: summer learning is essential for all students to be prepared in September to learn new material from day

FACT: Summer learning loss is cumulative

After the summer, students who need several weeks to get back into their school routine and catch up to where they left off in June can fall behind and potentially never catch back up. If the problem is not fixed, they can start every school year behind and never properly be at the level needed to be successful. The summer is the perfect time to catch up and get ahead.

FACT: Math skills take the hardest hit

It is no secret that many students struggle with math. Grade nine math is the most failed subject, and studies suggest that 2.6 months of grade-level equivalency can be lost over the summer if students do not partake in some form of learning program.

FACT: Summer learning loss is avoidable

It's not all bad news: summer learning programs allow students to focus on trouble areas and keep skills sharp in as little as 2-3 hours a week, which helps them maintain momentum, and head back to class prepared for the new school year. Knowing how to avoid summer learning loss is the first step to heading back to class confident and prepared to achieve any academic goals.

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CRAFT CORNER

Gearing up the garden.

very spring without fail, I start itching for my hands to be in the garden. I love watching the snow melt away and the earth begin to awaken after a long slumber. As I look through seed catalogs daydreaming, I realize I could spend my life savings on plants and accessories.

There is a lot of prep work to getting my garden ready, some indoor and most of it out. While I wait for the warmer weather to come around I like to start seeds inside. I usually keep track of the seedlings with popsicle sticks and a marker but this year I wanted to be a little more creative so I decided to use polymer clay.

Polymer clay is fully customizable and would be a great activity to involve the kids. You can mold the clay into shapes of your own or use cookie cutters. I decided to go with a rectangle shape that can be staked directly into the soil.

What you will need to make your own:

· Oven bake polymer clay (You should be able to make 15-20

markers with 1lb of clay)

- · Appropriate baking dish (I suggest lining it with parchment
- · Rolling pin
- Knife
- · Metal or Rubber stamps It helps to work on a non stick surface, like waxed paper or a silicone mat.

To start, divide the clay into 1-1.5" balls, then roll the balls into logs about 5"long. Using the roll-ing pin, roll the log flat to 1/4"

thickness and cut the bottom at an angle for the marker to easily penetrate the soil. Next place the soft clay markers on your baking dish lined with parchment. Use your fingers to smooth out any rough edges if you want to remove any imperfections. Stamp the markers and bake according to the package instructions (each brand is slightly dif-ferent in its temperature and cooking time). This material should be strong after baking but not unbreakable so be gentle.

Experiment with different shapes, colours of clay and paint until you have results that you are happy

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


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How to Ensure You Are Bringing Home a Healthy Dog or Cat

Bringing a furry new addition into your household is a great time for your family; your adorable new pet will bring great joy to both you and your children. All animals are loveable, so it's expected that you will spend significant time fawning over different breeds. However, you have to be careful that when selecting a dog or cat, you look out for warning signs that indicate ill health or susceptibility to disease. This is not an easy task! So in order to help you make the best decision, we've put together some of the

1) Eyes

When selecting a healthy dog or cat, you want to make sure that your new pet's eyes are bright and clear. Look out for any discharge collecting in the corners, as this can indicate susceptibility to conjunctivitis. A healthy dog or cat will have alert looking eyes, so if your potential pet looks tired or lethargic then take note, as this can lead to extensive veterinary trips early on.

tell-tale signs for choosing an active, healthy

2) Nose

Everyone knows that a healthy dog has a wagging tail and a moist nose, and this is no different when selecting newborns. Have a feel of the tip, is it rough and dry? Does it have any colored discharge? These are warning signs that your newborn pet isn't in full health, so be sure to make note. Also, watch out for any significant sneezing. A sneezing kitten can be adorable, but if it is extensive then it can also indicate allergies or respiratory infection.

3) Ears

For puppies and kittens, their ears should stand as per their breed. For instance, a Chihuahua puppy should be sharp and pinning vertically upwards, whereas a labrador usually has a set of floppy ears. Have a closer look and make sure that no wax or odour occurs; they should have a distinctive sweet smell. Make sure that there are no signs of ear mites lurking in and around the ears. They will appear as dark, grainy debris similar in appearance to coffee grounds and require a veterinary medication to resolve them.

4) Teeth and Gums

It is also worth checking your puppy or kitten's bite. The correct bite should have the upper incisors slightly overlapping the lower ones. It's also OK if the incisors meet edge to edge, however if the bottom set overlap the top then you may have to see a veterinarian about this. Their gums should be pink and healthy; pale or discolored gums suggest possible susceptibility to disease. By 8-12 weeks, your puppy or kitten should be eating solid food without any significant trouble.

5) General Health

There are some general signs to look out for when selecting a healthy dog or cat. Your new furry friend should be active and looking to explore at an early age. Most puppies or kittens are purchased at 8-12 weeks of age, so by this stage they should be able to walk fairly stable and remain active. Obviously, they will want to sleep a fair amount as would any baby, however if they are overall generally lethargic and exhausted then this is cause for concern.

Hold your pet in your hands and run your fingers through its coat. Make sure to get right down to the skin, which should be pale or pink. If there are any signs of redness of discoloration then you should have this looked over by a vet. Also, check for a regular heartbeat that doesn't seem out of some.

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
